In my opinion, the best part of the canyon is the two small "slots" that are beyond the major pools section. This is the first of these slots:








The bypass of the upper portion of this slot can be seen in the lower right side of this photo:




A small frog we spotted near the lower end of the slot:






Continuing up-canyon, we soon reach what appears to be an impasse:


