There were a few small patches of Nodding Sunflowers here.



As we were taking photos and eating lunch at this scenic spot, the clouds began to descend into the valley just north of Snowdon Peak. We also started hearing thunder, and saw some lightning across the valley.



Panorama looking north, east, and south again, as the clouds get darker.



Looking northeast towards where this trail will go. Bear Mountain can be seen to the left of center in this photo. We had originally planned to go much farther on this trail, but due to the concern of lightning we decided to head back from here.



Heading back along the trail. Notice that Engineer Mountain seems to be one of the few places that is still in the sun. It looks clearer to the south and towards Durango.

The most common flower here was these greenish ones; I'm not sure what they are called. There also were some flowers which could be of the same type that were red.

Some Alpine Harebell flowers near a small stream.



It looks like it is raining on Segment 24 of the Colorado Trail.



Here we are approaching the small stream photographed on the hike up.



Notice how the wildflowers are more apparent in the darker lighting.



This would be a nice spot to stop for a snack, except that biting insects seemed to be congregating here.



There were many of these small pink flowers near the stream.



Here are some tall white blooms.



The ever-present Indian Paintbrush.



On the left is a close-up of the blooming plants we have been seeing so many of on this hike. I think the yellow flowers on the right are called Alpine Avens.



The flowers are certainly denser near the stream than they are on the rest of this hike.



I am not sure what this plant with the dark-colored berries is called. I think I recall seeing it (or something very similar) in the Lake Louise area of Banff National Park.



Looking down the rather steep hillside at some more flowers.



Here the trail enters the trees. Notice that the sky is getting darker. It actually started raining right when we were loading our packs in the car, so we were fortunate to be off the trail before the rain started.
